HAPPY ISLAND, Hebei, China, in autumn: 19-22 Sep & 12-17 Oct 2007

An at-a-glance list of 197 species of birds recorded.

<u>Please note that the following list is best considered a work in progress. It should not be quoted without consulting the author.</u>

Based mostly on my own field notes, this brief write-up covers the birds noted by myself with Limosa/Field Guides & Rockjumper groups during visits to Happy Island in autumn 2007.

My reason for producing this compilation is that so few autumn trip reports are available on the internet, a state of affairs which is causing potential visitors to ask themselves – 'is Happy Island any good in autumn?'. And 'if it is, why don't birders go there??'.

In short, Happy Island <u>IS</u> a very good place to go in autumn – the answer to the second question is more complex: partly it is that Happy Island's spring migration is so well publicized that many birdwatchers just assume that it is not also 'an autumn place', partly that many Western Palearctic birders enjoy autumn in their own countries too much to go away (after all, this is when anything could turn up, even on your local patch, and so it is 'risky' to travel abroad...). And of course some birders DO visit in autumn!

The question 'is Happy Island better in spring or in autumn?' is quite unanswerable – what anyone asking it really means is 'for the best birdwatching experience, should I go in spring or in autumn?'... Who can predict the future? And one would have to, to answer that question: any given two or three week period between early March and early June, and between mid-August and early November has excellent potential, depending on what exactly you are looking for, but some years are better than others: as with any undertaking involving highly variable factors such as weather going birdwatching anywhere one needs at least a little luck to make it all happen.

In autumn the island serves as an extension to the mainland, situated right on the NNE/SSW migration axis – thus on many mornings you get strong visible migration, comparable to what you see at e g Falsterbo, on average much stronger than what you get in spring. If the winds are right, you may even get quite impressive numbers of birds of prey, far more than in spring. At the same time you get the 'island effect' producing frequently impressive falls of passerines.

Probably the main difference between spring and autumn is that in autumn migration is less concentrated... For many birders, the fact that one gets to see juvenile plumages (so much more relevant to your local Western Palearctic rarity hunting) completely compensates for this. From the birdwatching point of view an important difference – and that goes for nearby Beidaihe as well – is that the vegetation is much denser in autumn: consequently up until mid-October it can take quite a bit longer to actually see the birds.

While the island has not remained immune to change since discovered by birders in 1990, developments can scarcely be said to have significantly diminished the island's attractiveness to birds. Situated right on the flyway, its patches of woodland, areas of scrub, 'grassy-reedy flats', shrimp ponds & extensive mudflats (with an easily accessible high tide roost for waders, gulls & even cranes) continue to attract large numbers of migrants. If anything, most birdwatchers will now find the island a more agreeable holiday destination: accommodation and toilet/shower facilities are much better nowadays, and the infrastructure (access roads & mainland-to-island boat service) is much improved.

Great Cormorant Phalacrocorax carbo

One on 19th, c1,500 (a 'quite accurate count / estimate') on 20th, 800 on 21st & 10+ on 22 Sep, and 50+ on 12th, 1,000 on 13th, 500 on 14th, 160+ on 15th, 300 on 16th & 870 on 17 Oct.

Lesser Kestrel Falco naumanni

One male hovering, then ->SW at 13h30 on 13 Oct.

Common Kestrel Falco tinnunculus

Two on 19+20th & one on 21 Sep, and singles on 13+15th, two on 14th & three on 17 Oct.

Amur Falcon Falco amurensis

One female on 19 Sep, and <u>282</u> on 13th, 22 on 14th, seven on 15th, two on 16th & 91 on 17 Oct.

Merlin Falco columbarius

Singles on 13+14+15 Oct.

Eurasian Hobby Falco subbuteo

Two on 20th & singles on 21+22 Sep, and singles on 12+14th & five on 13 Oct.

Peregrine Falco peregrinus

Two daily over 12-16 Oct... undoubtedly at least three different individuals.

Osprey Pandion haliaetus

Singles on 19+20 Sep.

Black Kite Milvus migrans

One on 20 Sep.

Eastern Marsh Harrier Circus spilonotus

Six on 19th, five on 20+21st & four on 22 Sep, and four on 13th, singles on 14+15th & two on 16 Oct.

Hen Harrier Circus cyaneus

Four on 12th, eight (all ringtails flying to roost PM) on 13th, six on 14th, five on 15th, eight on 16th & five on 17 Oct.

Pied Harrier Circus melanoleucos

Singles on 19+22nd, 17 on 20th & three on 21 Sep.

Japanese Sparrowhawk Accipiter gularis

Three on 19th, 8+ on 20th, three on 21st & seven on 22 Sep, and four on 13th & two on 14+15+16 Oct.

Eurasian Sparrowhawk Accipiter nisus

Two on 19th, nine on 20th & four on 21 Sep, and two on 12th, eight on 13th, ten on 14th, four on 15th, five on 15th & one on 17 Oct.

Northern Goshawk Accipiter gentiles

Three on 13th & one adult male on 17 Oct.

Grey-faced Buzzard Butastur indicus

One 2+ c-y ('tail worn, moulting') on 13 Oct.

Common Buzzard Buteo buteo japonicus

Eight on 13th, 46 on 14th, four on 15th, two on 16th & five on 17 Oct.

Greater Spotted Eagle Aquila clanga

One 1st c-y seen well repeatedly from 10h38.

White-breasted Waterhen Amaurornis phoenicurus

One on 15 Oct.

Baillon's Crake Porzana pusilla

One on 16 Oct.

Common Moorhen Gallinula chloropus

Singles on 21 Sep & 16+17 Oct.

Sandhill Crane Grus canadensis

One on the ground with White-naped Cranes on 13 Oct.

***Perhaps only the 4th or 5th record for China.

White-naped Crane Grus vipio

38 on 13 Oct.

Common Crane Grus grus

Undoubtedly the same singleton with Red-crowned Cranes on 13+14 Oct.

Red-crowned Crane Grus japonensis

c30 on 13th, 18 on 14th & nine on 15 Oct.

Eurasian Oystercatcher Haematopus ostralegus

23 on 13th, 3+ on 14th, heard on 15th & 29 on 16 Oct.

Black-winged Stilt Himantopus himantopus

One on 20th, two on 21st & 15 on 22 Sep, and singles on 13+15+16 Oct.

Pied Avocet Recurvirosta avosetta

130 on 20th, 100+ on 21st & 30 on 22 Sep, and c625 on 13th, 420 on 14th & 270 on 16 Oct.

Northern Lapwing Vanellus vanellus

85 on 14th, seven on 15th & nine on 16 Oct.

Grey-headed Lapwing Vanellus cinereus

340 on 20th & 19 on 22 Sep.

Pacific Golden Plover Pluvialis fulva

Four on 20th & eight on 21 Sep.

Grey Plover Vanellus squatarola

Nine on 20th, ten on 21st & three on 22 Sep, and 2+ on 13th, heard on 14th, ten on 15th & two on 17 Oct.

Brown Shrike Lanius cristatus

One on 19th & two on 20+21+22 Sep,

Chinese Grey Shrike Lanius sphenocercus

Two on 19th, one on 20th, 1-2 on 21st & two on 22 Sep, and one daily over 13-17 Oct.

Black-naped Oriole Oriolus chinensis

Six on 20th & singles on 21+22 Sep.

Black Drongo Dicrurus macrocercus

Four on 19th, 13 together on 20th, 20 on 21st & one on 22 Sep.

Common Magpie Pica pica

Two on 20+21+22 Sep, and 20 on 13th, three on 14th, six on 15th, three on 16th & <u>24</u> on 17 Oct.

Rook Corvus frugilegus

One flew N on 15 Oct.

Carrion Crow Corvus corone

Singles on 13+16+17th, five on 14th & 41 on 15 Oct.

Great Tit Parus major minor 54)

Eight on 13th, five on 14th, 5+ on 15th, 34 on 16th & 75 on 17 Oct. ***Apparently not recorded on the island prior to autumn 2007...

Yellow-bellied Tit Parus venustulus

Eight on 13th, six on 14th, 4+ on 15th, 3+ on 16th & eight on 17 Oct.

Coal Tit Parus ater

Two on 13th, heard on 14th, 20 on 16th & 34 on 17 Oct.

Varied Tit Parus varius

An individual present on 16+17 Oct was apparently a provincial 1st...

Penduline Tit Remiz pendulinus

Heard on 12th, 165 on 13th, 155 on 14th, 185 on 15th, 55 on 16th & 340 on 17 Oct.

Sand Martin Riparia riparia

Singles on 20 Sep & 14 Oct.

Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica

50+ on 20th & 100+ on 21 Sep, and 200+ on 13th, 100+ on 14th, 200+ on 15th, 20 on 16th & 'far fewer' on 17 Oct.

Red-rumped Swallow Cecropis daurica

Four on 20 Sep, and ten on 13th, 5+ on 14th & six on 17 Oct.

Long-tailed Tit Aegithalos caudatus caudatus

11 on 16th & 12+ on 17 Oct.

Asian Short-toed Lark Calandrella cheleensis

Two on 13th & one on 17 Oct.

Eurasian Skylark Alauda arvensis

One on 20th & two on 21 Sep, and 200+ on 13th, 100+ on 14th, 75+ on 15+16th & 35+ on 17 Oct.

Fan-tailed Warbler Cisticola juncidis

One on 20th & five on 22 Sep, and two on 13th & one on 17 Oct.

Chinese Bulbul Pvcnonotus sinensis

Eight on 20th, 20+ on 21st & 13 on 22 Sep, and 10+ on 12+13+15th, 32 on 14th, five on 16th & 21 on 17 Oct.

Japanese Marsh Warbler Megalurus pryeri

One heard on 13th, two (of which one seen well) on 15th, one heard on 16th & two on 17 Oct.

Short-tailed Bush Warbler Urosphena squamiceps

One seen briefly on 17 Oct.

Lanceolated Warbler Locustella lanceolata

Four on 20+22 Sep & one on 14 Oct.

Thick-billed Warbler Phragmaticola aedon

One on 20 Sep.

Oriental Great Reed Warbler Acrocephalus orientalis

Two on 20th & one 'sitting up, 'scoped' on 21 Sep.

Black-browed Reed Warbler Acrocephalus bistrigiceps

Two on 20th, three on 21st & four on 22 Sep, and five on 13+15+16th, four on 14th & three on 17 Oct.

Dusky Warbler Phylloscopus fuscatus

Three on 19th, ten on 20th, 23 on 21st & 13 on 22 Sep, and one on 12th, 20 on 13th, five on 14+15th, six on 16th & three on 17 Oct.

Radde's Warbler Phylloscopus schwarzi

Six on 20th, seven on 21st & 24 on 22 Sep, and singles on 12+15 Oct.

Pallas's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus proregulus

4+ on 21st & two on 22 Sep, and two on 12th, 100+ on 13th, 50+ on 14th, 30 on 15th, 75+ on 16th & 20 on 17 Oct.

Yellow-browed Warbler Phylloscopus inornatus

Two on 19th, six on 20th, 34 on 21st & 18 on 22 Sep, and ten on 13th, four on 14+15+16th & one on 17 Oct.

Hume's Yellow-browed Warbler Phylloscopus humei humei

Undoubtedly the same bird present over 15-17 Oct.

Arctic Warbler Phylloscopus borealis

Two on 20+22nd & one on 21 Sep.

Greenish Warbler Phylloscopus trochiloides

Two on 21 Sep.

Pale-legged Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus tenellipes

Four on 19th, seven on 20th & one on 21 Sep.

Claudia's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus claudiae

One heard on 13 Oct.

Bearded Tit Panurus biarmicus

Two (a male with a female-type bird) on 16 Oct.

Chestnut-flanked White-eye Zosterops erythropleurus

850+ on 20th, 230+ on 21st & 25 on 22 Sep, and heard on 12th, c25 on 13th, 30 on 14th, 25 on 15+16th & 13 on 17 Oct.

Japanese White-eye Zosterops japonicus

Heard on 16th & 12 on 17 Oct.

Goldcrest Regulus regulus

Singles on 14+15+16th & two on 17 Oct.

Northern Wren Troglodytes troglodytes

1-2 on 15 Oct.

Eurasian Treecreeper Certhia familiaris

One on 14+16 Oct... the bird, probably the 1st recorded on the island, had been there for a few days before we arrived.

Four on 19th, 100+ on 20th, 16 on 21st & nine on 22 Sep, and two on 12th, 70 on 13th, 20 on 14th, 40 on 15th, five on 16th & three on 17 Oct.

White's Thrush Zoothera aurea

Two on 20th & singles on 21+22 Sep, and one on 15 Oct.

Grey-backed Thrush Turdus hortulorum

Singles on 12+13+17th & two on 14+15+16 Oct.

Eyebrowed Thrush Turdus obscurus

Six on 20 Sep, and 2+ on 12th & singles on 14+15 Oct.

Red-throated Thrush Turdus ruficollis

One on 15th & two on 17 Oct.

Naumann's Thrush Turdus naumanni

One on 21 Sep, and ten on 13th, two on 14th, four (showing especially well: three *eunomus* & one *naumanni*) on 15th, five on 16th & seven on 17 Oct.

Bluethroat Luscinia svecica

One on 21 Sep, and one on 16th & two on 17 Oct.

Siberian Rubythroat Luscinia calliope

Three on 20th, seven on 21st & one on 22 Sep, and one heard on 14 Oct.

Rufous-tailed Robin Luscinia sibilans

Singles on 15+16 Oct.

Northern Red-flanked Bluetail Tarsiger cyanurus

Two on 20th & four on 21 Sep, and 5+ on 12th, c25 on 13th, c65 on 14th, 20 on 15+17th & 50 on 16 Oct.

Daurian Redstart Phoenicurus auroreus

Three on 13th, one on 14th, four on 16th & six on 17 Oct.

Common Stonechat Saxicola torquatus
