# NE Tibet with OBC, 19 July - 08 August 2009.

An at-a-glance list of 225 species of birds & 17 species of mammals.

<u>Please note that the following list is best considered a work in progress. It should not be quoted without consulting the author.</u>

Based mostly on my own field notes, this brief write-up covers the birds & mammals noted by B Beers, R Hoff, K Kjellberg, P Los, D Melville, V Melville, D Myers, P Rostron, D Sargeant, G Tebb & myself during a 2009 OBC Fundraiser trip.

Thank you all for making this trip so enjoyable, and thank you for, by joining, contributing to OBC's Conservation Fund. Special thanks are due to Michael Edgecombe for volunteering to coordinate.

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In the species list the concept "bird-days" is used - it is the avian equivalent of manhours: for example, separate flocks of ten and 15 Henri's Snowfinches moving through score 25 bird-days, as would the same single individual seen daily for 25 days. The sum of day totals - a handy measure of relative abundance, nothing more.

The sequence of the bird list follows *The Howard and Moore Complete Checklist of the Birds of the World* –  $3^{rd}$  *Edition* (Dickinson 2003), in my opinion by far the most useful one-volume checklist to date.

Initials in brackets after a few single-observer sightings does not imply that I have doubts as to the correctness of the ID.

# **BIRDS**:

### Severtzov's Hazel Grouse Tetrastes sewerzowi

Two bird-days. An unusually cooperative male made our morning at Nangqian forest reserve on 30<sup>th</sup>, drawing attention to itself by calling and then presenting itself for extended viewing & photographing.

### Szechenyi's Monal Partridge Tetraophasis szechenyi

20+ bird-days. Noted on three dates. Noone felt we hadn't earned our excellent views of a pair with two fairly large juveniles...

### **Tibetan Snowcock** Tetraogallus tibetanus

No less than 22 in a day - an in many ways classic encounter: we were positioned (holding the proverbial cup of coffee!) well before the birds came out of roost and started calling, then watched them fly off down the hill where they were soon refound and 'scoped for a long while as they squabbled, herded-in their chicks, and kept up constant calling.

### Przevalski's Partridge Alectoris magna

Ten bird-days. Seen well on two dates...

### **Daurian Partridge** Perdix dauurica

Nine bird-days. Noted on three dates – most satisfyingly a pair w/ five chicks were found near Chaka.

### Tibetan Partridge Perdix hodgsoniae

35 bird-days. Noted on six dates. The species can be remarkably confiding... we were drinking cups of coffee & milling about to keep warm on a frost-crackling morning when our first individual gave itself away by calling.

#### Common Quail Coturnix coturnix

One heard (PR, DS) W of Koko Nor on 24<sup>th</sup>.

\*\*\*The first record - as far as we're aware - for NE Tibet for five years.

### **Blood Pheasant** Ithaginis cruentus

12 bird-days. Noted on three dates. Prolonged views were had by all, and great photos were obtained.

#### White Eared Pheasant Crossoptilon crossoptilon

Ten bird-days. Noted on three dates. Main event eight on 28<sup>th</sup>: 'we were positioned (holding the proverbial cup of coffee!) well before the birds came out of roost and started calling'... maybe due to the dawn chill many birds in Tibet are not very early risers so being in place before they appear frequently does not preclude keeping quite reasonable hours!

# Common Pheasant Phasanius colchicus

36+ bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### **Greylag Goose** Anser anser

53+ bird-days. Noted at Koko Nor on two dates – main event 50+ on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

### Bar-headed Goose Anser indicus

c390 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

### Whooper Swan Cygnus cygnus

Two adults at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>

### Ruddy Shelduck Tadorna ferruginea

163+ bird-days. Noted on eight dates. Several pairs with nearly full-grown young were seen.

### Gadwall Anas strepera

Four at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

# Mallard Anas platyrhynchos

Two at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

# Chinese Spotbill Anas zonorhyncha

9+ bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Garganey Anas querquedula

Three 'scoped at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

#### Common Teal Anas crecca

Three bird-days. Noted on three dates.

#### Red-crested Pochard Netta rufina

104+ bird-days. Noted on three dates – main event 100+ at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

### Common Pochard Aythya ferina

150+ bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Ferruginous Duck Aythya nyroca

Five bird-days. Noted on two dates.

### Tufted Duck Aythya fuligula

130+ bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Goosander Mergus merganser

25 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

#### Little Grebe Tachybaptus ruficollis

20+ bird-days. Noted on three dates, incl at Koko Nor w/ four adults & three juveniles on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

### Great Crested Grebe Podiceps cristatus

460+ bird-days. Noted on four dates - main event 300+ at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

### Black-necked Grebe Podiceps nigricollis

34 bird-days. Noted on two dates at Koko Nor.

### Black Stork Ciconia nigra

One N of Xining on 21<sup>st</sup>, wading in the shallows of a reservoir.

### Yellow Bittern Ixobrychus sinensis

A bonus bird on any Tibet trip - we saw five when we turned a Force Majeure change of plan to our advantage on 6<sup>th</sup>. One of them was a 1<sup>st</sup> c-y, presumably hatched locally.

### Chinese Pond Heron Ardeola bacchus

Four on 6<sup>th</sup>.

### Eastern Cattle Egret Bubulcus coromandus

24 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Grey Heron Ardea cinerea

13 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

#### Great Egret Ardea alba

Five bird-days. Noted only at Koko Nor, w/ three on 22<sup>nd</sup> & two on 7<sup>th</sup>.

#### Great Cormorant Phalacrocorax carbo

c75 bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Common Kestrel Falco tinnunculus

21 bird-days. Noted on 12 dates.

### Amur Falcon Falco amurensis

An great-looking 2<sup>nd</sup> c-y female on a wire on 6<sup>th</sup> - seen well in late afternoon sunshine, and considered a great bonus not least by some of our high-listing group members.

### Eurasian Hobby Falco subbuteo

6-7 bird-days. Noted on five dates – can be a gone-in-a-flash species of whatever habitat it finds itself in: a 2<sup>nd</sup> c-y bird hunting over desert W of Koko Nor was an unexpected bonus...

### Saker Falco cherrug

14 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Peregrine Falco peregrinus

A soaring adult on 6<sup>th</sup> was a bonus – only rarely recorded on summer trips in Tibet.

### Black Kite Milvus migrans lineatus

15 bird-days. Noted on nine dates.

#### Lammergeier Gypaetus barbatus

18 bird-days. Noted on no less than nine dates & frequently seen at close range.

### Himalayan Griffon Gyps himalayensis

94+ bird-days. Noted on 14 dates.

### Black Vulture Aegypius monachus

One seen briefly W of Koko Nor on 24th.

# Eurasian Sparrowhawk Accipiter nisus

Singletons were noted on four dates.

### Himalayan Buzzard Buteo burmanicus

Five bird-days. Noted S of Yushu on four dates.

\*\*\*Formerly considered a race of Common Buzzard *B. buteo* but genetically closer to Upland Buzzard *B. hemilasius* (Rasmussen & Anderton 2005) from which it is ecologically separated & easily - well, fairly easily! - distinguished...

### **Upland Buzzard** Buteo hemilasius

206+ bird-days. Noted on 12 dates.

### Golden Eagle Aquila chrysaetos

Nine bird-days. Noted on six dates.

### Common Moorhen Gallinula chloropus

18 bird-days. Noted on three dates – sightings included two adults w/ two chicks near Gonghe on 25<sup>th</sup>.

#### Common Coot Fulica atra

290+ bird-days. Noted on three dates - main event c200 at Koko Nor on 7th.

### Black-necked Crane Grus nigricollis

26 bird-days. This Tibetan endemic breeder was noted on four dates... WOW!

### Ibisbill Ibidorhyncha struthersii

11 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

\*\*\*Somehow, Ibisbills seen in Tibet feeding on a flowered-over meadow or (as our 1<sup>st</sup> pair was) 'frozen' against a rushing, icy stream - yaks snorting in the background - are more *real* than the sad one or two which cling on along the last stretch of barely acceptable water close to Beijing in competition with sickly-looking domestic ducks!

# **Black-winged Stilt** Himantopus himantopus

Eight at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup> incl a not-yet-full-grown juvenile.

## Northern Lapwing Vanellus vanellus

Nine at Koko Nor on 7<sup>th</sup>.

### Little Ringed Plover Charadrius dubius

Eight bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Kentish Plover Charadrius alexandrinus

50+ bird-days. Noted on four dates.

# Lesser Sand Plover Charadrius mongolus

c37 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

# Pintail Snipe Gallinago stenura

One flying over at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup> was early indeed - in previous years returning migrants have been recorded no earlier than 1 Aug (JH *et al.* pers obs)

#### Western Black-tailed Godwit Limosa limosa

66 bird-days. Noted on three dates – main event 44 S of Maduo on 4<sup>th</sup>.

### Spotted Redshank Tringa erythropus

Four bird-days. Noted at Koko Nor on two dates.

# Common Redshank Tringa totanus

155+ bird-days. Noted on ten dates.

# Marsh Sandpiper Tringa stagnatilis

One at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

# Common Greenshank Tringa nebularia

5+ bird-days. Noted on three dates.

# **Green Sandpiper** Tringa ochropus

Seven bird-days. Noted on four dates.

### Wood Sandpiper Tringa glareola

57+ bird-days. Noted on six dates.

# Common Sandpiper Actitis hypoleucos

31 bird-days. Noted on ten dates.

# Temminck's Stint Calidris temminckii

Four on 25<sup>th</sup>.

### Long-toed Stint Calidris subminuta

Two adults put on a good show at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

### Sharp-tailed Sandpiper Calidris acuminata

One adult at Koko Nor on 7th - not seen particularly well but a pleasing find nonetheless.

### Curlew Sandpiper Calidris ferruginea

Four at Koko Nor on 7<sup>th</sup>.

### Great Black-headed Gull Larus ichthyaetus

138+ bird-days. Noted on five dates - c50 approachable ('anyone got a spare memory card?') adults on a stream was a trip highlight.

### Brown-headed Gull Larus brunnicephalus

135 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Caspian Tern Sterna caspia

One adult at Koko Nor on 7<sup>th</sup>.

\*\*\*Possibly the 1st record for Tibet.

### Common Tern Sterna hirundo

153+ bird-days. Noted on 12 dates.

### Whiskered Tern Chlidonias hybrida

One (maybe two) adults at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

### Pallas's Sandgrouse Syrrhaptes paradoxus

A good session w/ a total of 34 birds – in flight, on the ground, calling - in desert W of Koko Nor on 24<sup>th</sup>.

\*\*\*Unfortunately the species' sought-after congener Tibetan Sandgrouse *Syrrhaptes thibetanus* eluded us despite many calories expended searching...

### Blue Hill Pigeon Columba rupestris

451+ bird-days. Noted on 19 dates.

### Snow Pigeon Columba leuconota

19 bird-days. Noted S of Yushu on three dates. One of those 'has-to-be-seen-to-be-believed' species...seeing these strikingly patterned birds effortlessly sail along the towering rock faces is a visual treat, the simple beauty of 'em enhancing the grandeur of the setting.

## Oriental Turtle Dove Streptopelia orientalis

21+ bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Eurasian Collared Dove Streptopelia decaocto

31 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

### Red Turtle Dove Streptopelia tranquebarica

One adult on a wire, then flying by on 2<sup>nd</sup>: a summering 'lost' migrant.

### Indian Cuckoo Cuculus micropterus

One heard [VM] near Gonghe on 25<sup>th</sup>.

### Common Cuckoo Cuculus canorus

22+ bird-days. Noted on eight dates.

#### Eurasian Eagle-Owl Bubo bubo

One full-grown juvenile seen well & photographed on 4<sup>th</sup>: another long-wished-for life bird for several group members – tingaling!

#### Pere David's Owl Strix davidi

Noted on two dates at Nangqian forest reserve - persistence paid off on 31<sup>st</sup> when a roosting bird was located towards the end of the day.

#### Little Owl Athene noctua

Ten bird-days. Noted on eight dates.

### **Common Swift** Apus apus

385+ bird-days. Noted on seven dates – main event 150+ at Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

# Fork-tailed Swift Apus pacificus

160+ bird-days. Noted on nine dates.

### Common Kingfisher Alcedo atthis

Five bird-days. Noted on two dates – one adult male S of Yushu on 3<sup>rd</sup> was a surprise.

### Hoopoe Upupa epops

133+ bird-days. Noted on 17 dates.

### Northern Wryneck Jynx torquilla

One [DM et al.] on 6<sup>th</sup>.

\*\*\*Prior to 2004 (when one adult seen near Gonghe on 23 June & two juveniles present on 11 July) no breeding season records although Cheng (1987) included E, SE & S Qinghai in the species' summer range.

At Golmud seen in autumn between 31 August and 3 October, with most records first half of September, including at least four birds on 2 September 1994. Remarkably, one was in the poplars next to the town hospital on 18 January 1991 [JH pers. obs.].

### Great Spotted Woodpecker Dendrocopos major

Ten bird-days. Noted on no less than five dates.

# Three-toed Woodpecker Picoides tridactylus

Two on 29<sup>th</sup>.

\*\*\*"

Taxonomy: needs re-evaluation. Nearctic and Palearctic races recently split into two species, *P. dorsalis* and *P. tridactylus*, without discussion of status of the very distinct *funebris.*": Rasmussen & Anderton (2005). The latter is listed by Zheng (ed., 2005) for Gansu, NE Qinghai, E Xizang, NW Yunnan & Sichuan. The 'N Paleartic' species is represented in China by *tianshanicus* (Tian Shan & Altai: Cheng 1987), *tridactylus* (NE Inner Mongolia & N Manchuria: Cheng 1987) & *kurodai* (SE Manchuria: Dickinson 2003 – Cheng (1987) did not list *kurodai*, including birds in this area with *tridactylus*).

### Black Woodpecker Dryocopus martius

Nine bird-days. Noted only at Nangqian forest reserve - it was pretty special to get prolonged encounters with vocal birds on several occasions.

### Grey-headed Woodpecker Picus canus

13 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

#### Isabelline Shrike Lanius isabellinus tsaidamensis

12+ bird-days. Noted on three dates, incl near Gonghe where rare.

### **Grey-backed Shrike** Lanius tephronotus

107+ bird-days. Noted on 17 dates..

### Tibetan Grey Shrike Lanius (sphenocercus) giganteus

Three bird-days. Noted on two dates. A low-density species, wide-ranging and often inconspicuous even when present (and thus easily missed), we were fortunate to see it well.

#### Black Drongo Dicrurus macrocercus

Singles en route on four dates.

### 'Eastern' Azure-winged Magpie Cyanopica cyanus

36+ bird-days. Noted on three dates in NE Qinghai.

- \*\*\*Fairly common around the grounds of our hotel in Beijing...
- \*\*\*Apparently (G Pettersson pers com) the Iberian taxon, *C. (c.) cooki*, has been shown to be sufficiently differentiated genetically to merit elevation to full species status. In addition to the ones we saw, *kansuensis* in NE Tibet & *interposita* at Beijing, the eastern species includes a further five taxa (Dickinson 2003)...

### Common Magpie Pica pica sericea

38 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Tibetan Magpie Pica (pica) bottanensis

92 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

\*\*\*The two *Pica* taxa occupy mutually exclusive ranges and display a number of vocal, morphological & habitat differences.

### Henderson's Ground Jay Podoces hendersoni

12 bird-days. Noted W of Koko Nor on three dates.

### Hume's Groundpecker Pseudopodoces humilis

169 bird-days. Noted on 14 bird-days.

\*\*\*Apparently most closely related to *Paridae* (Dickinson 2003; B King pers com.) but please let us refrain from concocting a new English name such as Tibetan Ground-tit!

### Red-billed Chough Pyrrhocorax pyrrhocorax

178+ bird-days. Noted on 15 dates.

### Alpine Chough Pyrrhocorax graculus

7+ bird-days. Seen (& heard!) on two dates S of Yushu.

#### Daurian Jackdaw Corvus dauuricus

39 bird-days. Noted on three days S of Yushu.

### Rook Corvus frugilegus

53+ bird-days. Noted N of Xining on two dates.

### Carrion Crow Corvus corone

21+ bird-days. Noted on two dates.

#### Large-billed Crow Corvus macrorhynchos

56+ bird-days. Noted on six dates.

\*\*\*All the ones seen would have been ssp tibetosinensis (Cheng 1987).

#### Common Raven Corvus corax

45 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

### 'Great' Tit Parus major minor

22 bird-days. Noted on seven dates - ssp *minor* near Xining & ssp *tibetanus* S of Yushu. \*\*\*Both taxa belong with *minor*, one on 3-4 'Great Tit' species in China. Keep your fingers crossed that the inappropriate name 'Japanese' Tit doesn't stick!

### Rufous-vented Tit Parus rubidiventris

47 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Songar Tit Parus songarus

35 bird-days. Noted on six dates N of Xining (ssp affinis) & S of Yushu (ssp weigoldicus).

#### White-browed Tit Parus superciliosus

13 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

# **Grey Crested Tit** Parus dichrous

26 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

# Pale Sand Martin Riparia diluta

99 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

#### Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica

Five bird-days. Noted W of Koko Nor on three dates.

### Eurasian Crag Martin Ptyonoprogne rupestris

14 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

# Asian House Martin Delichon dasypus

78+ bird-days. Noted on eight dates.

### Red-rumped Swallow Cecropis daurica

35+ bird-days. Noted on three dates.

# **Long-tailed Tit** Aegithalos caudatus vinaceus

35+ (= several family groups) were seen on 6<sup>th</sup>.

### White-browed Tit-Warbler Leptopoecile sophiae

27 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Crested Tit-Warbler Leptopoecile elegans

36+ bird-days. Noted on five dates - on 2<sup>nd</sup> a group of at least six birds 'delayed' us in the most memorable way: a couple of males sitting out in perfect light at <10m, females feeding in nuthatchey fashion... TINGALING!

\*\*\*Typically not a species that draws attention to itself - however, patience and persistance can be amply rewarded... Iv'e leafed through the dictionary and two Birdquest brochures in search of a superlative which fully does justice to this jewel, but in vain.

### Mongolian Lark Melanocorypha mongolica

Eight bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Long-billed Calandra Lark Melanocorypha maxima

19 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

### Hume's Short-toed Lark Calandrella acutirostris

11 bird-days. Noted on three dates.

# Asian Short-toed Lark Calandrella cheleensis

23 bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Oriental Skylark Alauda gulgula

Widespread – not systematically recorded.

### Horned Lark Eremophila alpestris

Widespread – not systematically recorded.

### Chinese Hill Warbler Rhopophilus pekinensis leptorhynchus

This enigmatic species made a rare appearance on a NE Tibet trip list with an active and comparatively showy group of 3+ seen.

# Spotted Bush Warbler Bradypterus thoracicus

No less than six singing (of which two were seen well) N of Xining on 20th was a bit of a bonus.

### Oriental Great Reed Warbler Acrocephalus orientalis

12 on 8<sup>th</sup> – a real bonus!

# Dusky Warbler Phylloscopus fuscatus weigoldicus

Four in the S Koko Nor range on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

\*\*\*Martens (2008) unconvincingly aligns *weigoldicus* with Smoky Warbler *P. fuligiventer* <a href="http://globiz.sachsen.de/snsd/publikationen/vertebrate-zoology/vz58-2/06\_Martens.pdf">http://globiz.sachsen.de/snsd/publikationen/vertebrate-zoology/vz58-2/06\_Martens.pdf</a>

### Tickell's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus affinis

106 bird-days. Noted on 11 dates.

\*\*\*Martens (2008) elevates part of this species to full species status as *P. occisinensis* <a href="http://globiz.sachsen.de/snsd/publikationen/vertebrate-zoology/vz58-2/06\_Martens.pdf">http://globiz.sachsen.de/snsd/publikationen/vertebrate-zoology/vz58-2/06\_Martens.pdf</a>

### Yellow-streaked Warbler Phylloscopus armandii

81 bird-days. Noted on eight dates.

### **Buff-barred Leaf Warbler** Phylloscopus pulcher

20 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

### Gansu Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus kansuensis

16 birds were noted N of Xining on 20<sup>th</sup>.

\*\*\*This attractive warbler has only recently been reaccepted as a valid species, and its winter quarters remain to be discovered...

### Chinese Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus yunnanensis

8-9 bird-days. Noted on three dates N of Xining.

## 'Eastern' Lemon-rumped Warbler Phylloscopus 'forresti'

28 bird-days. Noted S of Yushu on five dates.

\*\*\*Martens et al. 2004 (vide Rheindt 2006) elevated forresti, considered a synomym of chloronotus by Cheng (1987), to full species status, splitting it from chloronotus (of Nepal) which, with simlaensis, becomes Western Lemon-rumped Warbler. The two differ "dramatically in song and mitochondrial DNA (4.2% cytochrome-b divergence)": Rheindt (2006). Given that the type locality for forresti is Lijiang, in Yunnan (Cheng 1987) it is not obvious that "Sichuan Leaf Warbler' is preferable to 'Eastern Lemon-rumped Warbler'. "Presumably the hitherto unknown border between both species lies somewhere in Yunnan, Burma or north-eastern India.": Rheindt (2006). Ahem?

### Hume's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus humei

68 bird-days. Noted on six dates - main event 45+ N of Xining on 20th.

### Greenish Warbler Phylloscopus trochiloides

67 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

### 'Margelanic' Desert Lesser Whitethroat Sylvia (minula) margelanica

One was seen well W of Koko Nor on 24<sup>th</sup> (where two were present in early June: JH *et al* pers obs) - a somewhat obscure taxon...

### Spot-breasted Scimitar Babbler Pomatorhinus erythrocnemis dedekeni

17 bird-days. Noted at Nangqian forest reserve on four dates.

\*\*\*Collar (2006) elevated *odicus* (of NE and E Burma, N Indochina, S Yunnan and Guizhou (except N), *decarlei* (of 'E Xizang', SW Sichuan, and NW Yunnan), '*dedekensi [sic]*' (of '(N)E Xizang', W Sichuan, and NW Yunnan), *gravivox* (of S Gansu, S Shaanxi, S Shanxi, NW Henan, and N Sichuan), and *cowensae* (of C and E Sichuan, N Guizhou, and W Hubei) to species status on morphological grounds, a 'new arrangement, which clearly rests on uncertain foundations and is in need of considerable fortification (which is not supplied by morphometric analysis, as this shows as much variation within the new species as between them, notably a remarkably long tail in *dedekensi* [sic]...)'. In the absence of DNA analysis and a thorough study of the notoriously varied vocalizations of these birds, such rearrangement seems fairly meaningless...

#### Kozlov's Babax Babax koslowi

13 bird-days. Noted on four dates - occupying a restricted range this was one of our main targets. Often a rather tricky one to dig out but this time the species could hardly have surrendered itself more easily: we got superb views of the localised endemic on more than one occasion.

### Pere David's Laughingthrush Garrulax davidi

50+ bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Giant Laughingthrush Garrulax maximus

c76 bird-days. Noted on five dates. This superb-looking species has an impressive range of calls, some subdued, some anything but, yet others direct or derived mimicry – duetting birds are often a striking component in the dawn chorus, and throughout the day groups traveling through the pristine forest will mark their progress with sessions of loud calling.

### Elliot's Laughingthrush Garrulax elliotii

144+ bird-days. Noted on nine dates.

### Chinese Fulvetta Alcippe striaticollis

3+ seen well at Nangqian forest reserve - a pleasant surprise as we'd been unable to find any on our visits earlier in the season...

#### Goldcrest Regulus regulus

23 bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Northern Wren Troglodytes troglodytes

12 bird-days. Noted on four dates – main event seven N of Xining on 21st.

#### Chinese Nuthatch Sitta villosa

12 birds N of Xining on 20<sup>th</sup> incl several seen very well.

### Przevalski's Nuthatch Sitta przwalskii

Ten bird-days. Noted on four dates – a species which invariably makes the hypothetical Bird of the Trip shortlist!

### Wallcreeper Tichodroma muraria

Six bird-days. Noted on two dates.

### Eurasian Treecreeper Certhia familiaris

Seven birds N of Xining on 20<sup>th</sup>.

# Hodgson's Treecreeper Certhia hodgsoni

Eight bird-days. Noted daily at Nangqian forest reserve.

\*\*\*This new-ish split "embraces the Sino-Himalayan [taxa] *hodgsoni* Brooks, 1874 (W Himalayas), *mandellii* Brooks, 1874 (E Himalayas) and *khamensis* Bianchi 1903 (SW & W China [N as far as the road between Jiuzhaigou & Sungpan in N Sichuan]": D T Tietze *et al.* (2006)

### White-cheeked Starling Sturnus cineraceus

Seven bird-days. Noted W of Koko Nor on two dates.

\*\*\*A bit of a rarity in this part of the world...

### Long-tailed Thrush Zoothera dixoni

Three singing birds were noted at Nangqian forest reserve on 29<sup>th</sup> – one seen in flight...

### Chestnut Thrush Turdus rubrocanus

15 bird-days. Noted on three dates N of Xining.

# Kessler's Thrush Turdus kessleri

79+ bird-days. This emblematic species was noted on nine dates.

### **Chinese Song Thrush** Turdus mupinensis

One seen N of Xining on 21st.

### Siberian Rubythroat Luscinia calliope

26 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Himalayan Rubythroat Luscinia pectoralis

20 bird-days. Noted on three dates – a very cooperative male on 27<sup>th</sup> allowed our team photographers to go to work.

### Himalayan Red-flanked Bluetail Tarsiger rufilatus

17 bird-days. Noted S of Yushu on four dates.

\*\*\*In addition, a 1<sup>st</sup> c-y bird N of Xining on 20<sup>th</sup> may also have been this species.

\*\*\*The split (accepted by e g Rasmussen & Anderton 2005) from the Siberian taxon is based mainly on morphological and vocal differences. While I have no real problem with the split it may be worth bearing in mind that there are consistent differences in song between birds in NE Qinghai and those in the SE.

# Przevalski's Redstart Phoenicurus alaschanicus

Some of the eight birds seen W of Koko Nor allowed us prolonged looks at point-blank range... Noone argued against my only-half-in-jest assertion that this is the prettiest member of the genus: WOW!

#### Black Redstart Phoenicurus ochruros

84 bird-days. Noted on 17 dates.

### Hodgson's Redstart Phoenicurus hodgsoni

37 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

### White-throated Redstart Phoenicurus schisticeps

23 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

#### Daurian Redstart Phoenicurus auroreus

Five bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Guldenstadt's Redstart Phoenicurus erythrogastrus

23 bird-days. Noted on five dates this extremely attractive high-mountain specialist put on a good show for us.

#### Blue-fronted Redstart Phoenicurus frontalis

31 bird-days. Noted on ten dates.

#### White-bellied Redstart Hodgsonius phaenicuroides

Eight bird-days. Noted on three dates – this notorious skulker managed to stay hidden from most of us despite prolonged tape sessions...

### River Chat Chaimarrornis leucocephalus

39 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

### Grandala Grandala coelicolor

Noted on two dates: a pair led us on on the 1<sup>st</sup> longish stroll of the trip, eventually rewarding us with nice views; later on a group of six birds disappeared around a corner, disappointingly not to reappear...

# 'Common' Stonechat Saxicola 'torquatus' przewalskii

Four bird-days. Noted on three dates.

\*\*\*Sspp *maurus, przewalskii* & *stejnegeri* occur in China / Tibet. Dickinson (2003): "proposed splits of this complex species seem unsatisfactory if only in how the forms are ascribed to species".

### Isabelline Wheatear Oenanthe isabellina

21 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

#### Pied Wheatear Oenanthe pleschanka

Five bird-days. Noted on two dates.

### **Desert Wheatear** Oenanthe deserti

4+ bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Sooty Flycatcher Muscicapa sibirica

18 bird-days. Noted at Nangqian on three dates.

\*\*\*Work on vocalizations may well lead to suggestions that the distinctive *rothschildi* be elevated to full species status...

# Slaty-backed Flycatcher Ficedula hodgsonii

16 bird-days. Noted on five dates – three adult males showing well N of Xining on 20<sup>th</sup> made an impression...

### White-throated Dipper Cinclus cinclus

Eight bird-days. Noted on five dates – birds of both colour morphs were seen well.

### **Eurasian Tree Sparrow** Passer montanus

Widespread – not systematically recorded.

### Rock Sparrow Petronia petronia

57+ bird-days. Noted on eight dates.

### Henri's Snowfinch Montifringilla henrici

63+ bird-days. Noted on four dates - main event 42+ at Er La.

### Tibetan (=Himalayan) Snowfinch Montifringilla adamsi

27 bird-days. Noted on eight dates.

\*\*\*Rather plain on the ground but spectacular in flight, this species is blessed with no less than four English names...

### White-rumped Snowfinch Onychostruthus taczanowskii

26 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

# Pere David's Snowfinch Pyrgilauda davidiana

c25 near Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>.

### Rufous-necked Snowfinch Pyrgilauda ruficollis

130+ bird-days. This pretty bird was noted on the High Plateau on six dates.

### Blanford's Snowfinch Pyrgilauda blanfordi

16 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Alpine Accentor Prunella collaris

Nine bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Robin Accentor Prunella rubeculoides

29 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

### Rufous-browed Accentor Prunella strophiata

29 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

### Brown Accentor Prunella fulvescens

26 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

### Maroon-backed Accentor Prunella immaculate

26 bird-days. Noted on three dates - this retiring species was seen well in above-average numbers...

# Citrine Wagtail Motacilla citreola

41 bird-days. Noted on 12 dates.

\*\*\*Only ssp calcarata was identified.

### Grey Wagtail Motacilla cinerea

One – possibly two – male(s) were present at Nangqian forest reserve on 30<sup>th</sup>.

### White Wagtail Motacilla alba leucopsis & M. a. alboides

162 bird-days. Noted on 15 dates.

\*\*\*Dickinson (2003) evidently consider without merit the idea that *lugens* is a valid species. Alstrom & Mild (2003) also concludes that various factors "suggest that the White Wagtail is best treated as a single species under the BSC".

### Richard's Pipit Anthus richardi

23+ bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Olive-backed Pipit Anthus hodgsoni

22 bird-days. Noted on eight dates.

### Rosy Pipit Anthus roseus

9+ bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Water Pipit Anthus spinoletta

17 bird-days. Noted N of Xining on two dates.

### Oriental Greenfinch Carduelis sinica

12 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

### Eurasian Siskin Carduelis spinus

Four N of Xining included two fine males – one treated us to a spectacular, rarely seen song-flight.

#### Twite Carduelis flavirostris

134 bir-days. Noted on 12 dates.

# Plain Mountain Finch Leucosticte nemoricola

c49 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

#### Brandt's Mountain Finch Leucosticte brandti

26 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

### Mongolian Trumpeter Finch Bucanetes mongolicus

Eight W of Koko Nor on 24<sup>th</sup> - a rather unpredictable species but this time found without undue effort.

\*\*\*A pair was seen copulating & collecting nest material.

### Przevalski's Rosefinch Urocynchramus pylzowi

Four birds were found near Koko Nor - seen extremely well & even noted doing its famed parachute display flight... Now considered to represent a monotypic family this pretty bird can prove hard to find.

### Common Rosefinch Carpodacus erythrinus

52 bird-days. Noted on nine dates.

\*\*\*Local breeders are ssp *roseatus* (Dickinson 2003) which differs markedly from at least the nominate...

### Chinese Beautiful Rosefinch Carpodacus davidianus

16 bird-days. Noted on six dates - 'scope views of males on several occasions...

### Pink-rumped Rosefinch Carpodacus eos

29 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

### Sinai Rosefinch Carpodacus synoicus

Nine near Xining on 19<sup>th</sup> – 'scope views of a male was exactly what we'd come hoping for! \*\*\*It seems likely that *beicki* will be proved specifically distinct from at least the nominate.

### Three-banded Rosefinch Carpodacus trifasciatus

14 bird-days. Noted on four dates at Nanggian forest reserve.

### Chinese White-browed Rosefinch Carpodacus dubius

87 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

#### Eastern Great Rosefinch Carpodacus rubicilloides

35 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

\*\*\*Several close encounters with adult males, rewarding in their own right, left us well prepared to recognize a Spotted Great Rosefinch *Carpodacus severtzovi...* but no luck with that one!

### Red-fronted Rosefinch Pyrrhospiza punicea

15-16 bird-days. Noted on no less than three dates.

\*\*\*Dickinson (2003) include 'our' area in the range of ssp *longirostris*.

#### Roborovski's Rosefinch Kozlowia roborowskii

8-9 bird-days. Noted on three dates...

### Crimson-browed Finch Pinicola subhimachala

Three bird-days. Different singletons noted on three dates - we all got excellent views of this sought-after species when a male responded well to the tape on 29<sup>th</sup>.

#### Red Crossbill Loxia curvirostra

43+ bird-days. Noted N of Xining & S of Yushu on five dates.

\*\*\*Clements (1993) include our area in the range of ssp himalayensis.

### Grey-headed Bullfinch Pyrrhula erythaca

31 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

### White-winged Grosbeak Mycerobas carniceps

15 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

#### Pine Bunting Emberiza leucocephalos

Six W of Koko Nor on 23<sup>rd</sup>... for several group members seeing males well was a delightful way of putting a long-standing bogey bird to rest!

### Eastern Rock Bunting Emberiza godlewskii

71 bird-days. Noted on 13 dates.

### Meadow Bunting Emberiza cioides

Six bird-days. Noted on two dates.

### Kozlov's Bunting Emberiza koslowi

14 bird-days. Only when this highly localised endemic is 'in the bag' does anyone allow themselves a sigh of relief and a pleasant 1<sup>st</sup> taste of 'we've done it!'. And did we do it!! Superb views and ditto photo opportunities of adult males, adult females & fledged juveniles.

### Black-faced Bunting Emberiza spodocephala

Nine bird-days. Noted on three dates.

### Mammals:

### **Assam Macaque** *Macaca assamensis*

3+ heard at Nangqian forest reserve on 29th.

### Himalayan Marmot Marmota himalayana

Widespread – not systematically recorded.

### \*\*\*?Tibetan Dwarf Hamster Cricetulus tibetanus

Two at Er La.

\*\*\*With a better (if still inadequate) mammal guide and access to PL's excellent photos we were at least able to take one step forward in concluding that these were NOT (as previously 'assumed') Stoliczka's Mountain Vole *Alticola stoliczkanus* 

#### Plateau Pika Ochotona curzoniae

Widespread – not systematically recorded.

# Glover's Pika Ochotona gloveri

Several seen.

### \*\*\*? Moupin Pika Ochotona thibetana

A baby pika at Nangqian forest reserve on 30<sup>th</sup> was thought to be this species.

#### Woolly Hare Lepus oiostolus

Widespread – not systematically recorded.

### \*\*\*?Gansu Mole Scapanulus oweni

Mole hills noted on several dates were thought to be the work of this species.

### Pallas' Cat Felis manul

One 'scoped at c400m at Er La as it sat out enjoying the morning sun.

### Wolf Canis lupus

Single animals were seen well (and in the case of one, photographed) on two dates.

### Tibetan Fox Vulpes ferrilata

Between us we saw close to ten different animals...

## Red Fox Vulpes vulpes

Two were seen well.

# Alpine (= Mountain) Weasel Mustela altaica

Some of us saw one near Nangqian.

# Kiang Equus kiang

28 animal-days.

# Red Deer Cervus elaphus

Two males on 29<sup>th</sup> – a below-average showing.

# Goitred Gazelle Gazella subgutturosa

16 W of Koko Nor on 22<sup>nd</sup>...two individuals engaged in semi-serious sparring.

# Tibetan Gazelle Procapra picticaudata

107+ animal-days. Noted on six dates.

# Blue Sheep Pseudois nayaur

161+ animal-days. Noted on five dates - main event 115+ on 2<sup>nd</sup>: WOW! views had by all...
