Manchuria (& Beijing) 4-12 May 2011

An at-a-glance list of 166 species of birds recorded.

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<u>Please note that the following list is best considered a work in progress. It should not be quoted without consulting the author.</u>

Based mostly on my own field notes, this brief write-up covers the birds noted on a visit by W Farrelly, I Graham, R Graham, A Huitfeldt, E Klim, R Klim, L Larsson, G Pettersson & myself. to Manchuria & E-most Inner Mongolia in search of waterfowl, cranes & Jankowski's Bunting, very likely E Asia's most endangered species.

Having allowed for 'interesting' weather and difficulties in locating Jankowski's Bunting the visit was a day longer than in 2010. For most of us, the trip presented an opportunity for a bit of extra birdwatching at what is frequently a very rewarding time in E/NE China: on the morning of our departure all but two of us covered the Huairou area, and after Manchuria two group members pushed on to Fujian for Chinese Crested Tern while another two remained in Beijing to combine some local birding with a bit of sightseeing. The outing on 4th added 17 species to the 167 recorded in Manchuria – for want of what else to do with them, and to make it easier for future travellers to decide if it might be worth their while to extend their visit by a day or two, these are included in the list.

Thank you all for making this trip so enjoyable!

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In the species list the concept "bird-days" is used - it is the avian equivalent of man-hours: for example, separate flocks of ten and 15 Oriental Plovers moving through score 25 bird-days, as would the same single individual seen daily for 25 days. The sum of day totals - a handy measure of relative abundance, nothing more.

The sequence of the bird list follows *The Howard and Moore Complete Checklist of the Birds of the World* – 3^{rd} *Edition* (Dickinson 2003), in my opinion by far the most useful one-volume checklist to date.

Initials in brackets after some 'non-leader' sightings does not imply that I have doubts as to the correctness of the ID.

Species list:

Daurian Partridge Perdix dauurica

Just two were seen – less time was spent in appropriate habitat than on previous trips...

Japanese Quail Coturnix japonica

Three bird-days. Noted on two dates.

Common Pheasant Phasanius colchicus

14 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

***In addition, nine were recorded near Huairou on 4th.

Swan Goose Anser cygnoides

70+ bird-days. This graceful species was noted on three dates.

Bean Goose Anser fabalis

c625 bird-days. Although the bulk of the staging birds had already departed (comparatively early: in 2010 we saw >3,000 birds in one day) we obtained superb views of both sspp serrirostris & middendorffii – noted on four dates.

Greylag Goose Anser anser

Six bird-days. Noted on two dates.

Greater White-fronted Goose Anser albifrons

117+ bird-days. Noted on four dates.

Lesser White-fronted Goose *Anser erythropus*

144+ bird-days. This sought-after species was seen on three dates – unsurpassable views allowed us to thoroughly familiarize ourselves with it...

Whooper Swan Cygnus cygnus

20 [WF] on 9th.

Common Shelduck Tadorna tadorna

43 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

***Mandarin Duck Aix galericulata

Superb views of seven birds N of Beijing on 4th.

Gadwall Anas strepera

88+ bird-days. Noted on five dates.

Falcated Duck Anas falcata

29 bird-days. This superb duck was noted on five dates – on 9th, a bit of deft maneuvering at the edge of the reeds secured unobscured 'scope views at point blank range!

Eurasian Wigeon Anas penelope

20 paired-up birds were noted on 11th.

Mallard Anas platyrhynchos

43 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

***An additional six birds were seen N of Beijing on 4th.

Chinese Spotbill Anas zonorhyncha

60 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

Northern Shoveler Anas clypeata

51+ bird-days. Noted on six dates.

Northern Pintail Anas acuta

55 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

Garganey Anas querquedula

26 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

Baikal Teal Anas formosa

195 bird-days. This enigmatic duck was noted on two dates – quite satisfying 'scope views were had once we cranked up the zoom: WOW!

Common Teal Anas crecca

c422 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

Common Pochard Aythya ferina

113+ bird-days. Noted on five dates.

Tufted Duck Aythya fuligula

Six birds on 11th was all...

Common Goldeneye Bucephala clangula

Two on 10th.

Red-breasted Merganser *Mergus serrator*

A pair in flight on 9th.

Little Grebe Tachybaptus ruficollis

38 bird-days. Noted on three dates.

***In addition, 3+ were recorded near Beijing on 4th.

Red-necked Grebe *Podiceps grisegena*

One in summer plumage at Xianghai reserve – rarely recorded in China.

Great Crested Grebe Podiceps cristatus

c89 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

Black-necked Grebe Podiceps nigricollis

58 bird-days. Noted on three dates.

Eurasian Spoonbill Platalea leucorodia

26 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

Eurasian Bittern Botaurus stellaris

6+ bird-days. Noted on four dates - most were heard-onlies but at least one showed itself...

***Black-crowned Night Heron Nycticorax nycticorax

Three near Beijing on 4th.

***Chinese Pond Heron Ardeola bacchus

Seen near Huairou on both 4+12th.

Grey Heron Ardea cinerea

19 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

***An additional 16+ were seen N of Huairou on 4th.

Purple Heron Ardea purpurea

19+ bird-days. Noted on three dates – superb views on 7th, when we were able to 'scope birds assembling at a small colony.

***Great Egret Ardea alba

Two en route near Beijing on 4th.

***Little Egret Egretta garzetta

One en route near Beijing on 4th.

Great Cormorant Phalacrocorax carbo

Three bird-days. Noted on just two dates.

Common Kestrel Falco tinnunculus

Six bird-days. Noted on four dates.

***In addition, one was seen N of Huairou on 4th.

Amur Falcon Falco amurensis

100 bird-days. Noted almost daily - WOW! views on a number of occasions...

Saker Falco cherrug

Three on 10th – exactly what we'd climbed that hill hoping for...

***In addition, a large falcon seen on 6th was almost certainly also this species (rather than Peregrine *F. peregrinus*)

Black Kite Milvus migrans

One migr on 8th.

Eastern Marsh Harrier Circus spilonotus

14 bird-days. Noted on three dates.

Hen Harrier Circus cyaneus

One 2nd c-y bird on 9th.

Pied Harrier Circus melanoleucos

Four 2nd c-y birds were noted.

Eurasian Sparrowhawk Accipiter nisus

Singles were noted on two dates.

***An additional single was seen N of Beijing on 4th.

Eastern Buzzard Buteo (buteo) japonicus

Four bird-days. The last of the season's N-bound migrants...

***DNA evidence has emerged that *Buteo buteo* is NOT the closest relative of '*japonicus*'.

Greater Spotted Eagle Aquila clanga

One immature bird was seen well on 9th.

Great Bustard Otis tarda

No less than 36 were counted on 7th – most were males, and many were doing the famous inside-out, fluff of feathers display!

Eastern Water Rail Rallus indicus

Two obliging individuals were 'scoped on 8th.

Common Moorhen Gallinula chloropus

Two on 7th.

Common Coot Fulica atra

14 bird-days. Noted on three dates.

Siberian Crane Grus leucogeranus

Noted on three dates, with a max count of 2,700 on 8th – a hard-to-beat spectacle, and cheering that more is nowadays done to protect these magnificent birds' staging areas.

White-naped Crane Grus vipio

6+ bird-days. Noted on three dates – at least two breeding pairs at Xianghai reserve...

Common Crane Grus grus

11 on 6th.

Hooded Crane Grus monacha

12 bird-days. Noted on two dates.

Red-crowned Crane *Grus japonensis*

Noted only at Xianghai reserve - two nesting pairs.

Eurasian Oystercatcher Haematopus ostralegus

One on 9th.

Black-winged Stilt Himantopus himantopus

325+ bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

Pied Avocet Recurvirosta avosetta

44 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

Northern Lapwing Vanellus vanellus

c45 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

Grey-headed Lapwing Vanellus cinereus

57 bird-days. Noted on seven dates.

Pacific Golden Plover Pluvialis fulva

48 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

***Long-billed Plover Charadrius placidus

Two N of Beijing on 4th did their best to elude us...

Little Ringed Plover Charadrius dubius

53 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

Kentish Plover Charadrius alexandrinus

Singletons were noted on three dates.

Lesser Sand Plover Charadrius mongolus

Four [AH, LL, GP] on 9th.

Oriental Plover Charadrius veredus

Four birds 'just over the border' on 10th – display-flighting in early morning sunshine these magnificent birds came close to upstaging even the Siberian Cranes...

Eurasian Woodcock Scolopax rusticola

One [WF] on 8th.

Pintail Snipe Gallinago stenura

Seven bird-days. Noted on three dates – several satisfying encounters...

Common Snipe Gallinago gallinago

85+ bird-days. Noted on six dates.

Asian Dowitcher *Limnodromus semipalmatus*

One on 6th – busily feeding 'sewing machine' style at reasonable range.

Eastern Black-tailed Godwit Limosa (limosa) melanuroides

24 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

***On the 2010 we saw a Western Black-tailed Godwit *Limosa limosa* in flight with a bunch of 'Easterners' – it was pretty obvious!

***Eastern Black-tailed Godwit is "a small and dark version of 'Western', with a similarly patterned but slimmer, shorter bill, a small but more prominent whitish supercilium between darker crown and eye-stripe.[...] Much less sexually dimorphic than 'Western'. Breeding male has darker chestnut head, neck, breast and sides, with closer-spaced, finer blackish barring on underparts, including vent, than breeding male 'Western', and more heavily black-blotched upperparts with broader golden or rufous edgings. Breeding female usually somewhat duller. Non-breeding adult is essentially dark grey with white lower underparts; darker grey than non-breeding 'Western'[...]. Juvenile is shorter-billed than adult; has weaker cinnamon tinge than juvenile 'Western', finely notched dark-and-golden scapular- and tertial-edges, barring not streaking on flanks, and looks all-dark above as tertials and mantle feathers wear. [...] distinct white wing-stripe and rump somewhat narrower than than in 'Western'": Rasmussen & Anderton (2005).

Little Whimbrel Numenius minutus

One migr in the morning of 11th.

***The bird tried to evade detection by giving a Whimbrel-like contact / alarm call rather than the distinctive, rising display call that we'd been listening out for!

Whimbrel *Numenius phaeopus* Two birds present on both 9+11th.

Eurasian Curlew Numenius arquata

17 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

Spotted Redshank Tringa erythropus

14 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

Common Redshank *Tringa totanus* c30 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

Marsh Sandpiper Tringa stagnatilis

165 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

Common Greenshank Tringa nebularia

19 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

Green Sandpiper *Tringa ochropus*

23+ bird-days. Noted on three dates.

Wood Sandpiper Tringa glareola

395+ bird-days. Noted daily – regrouping, mixed flocks of Wood & Marsh Sandpipers, kept flighty by a quartering harrier, was a highlight of 8th!

Common Sandpiper Actitis hypoleucos

19 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

Temminck's Stint Calidris temminckii

43 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

Long-toed Stint Calidris subminuta

Instructive views of a single bird on 8th...

Sharp-tailed Sandpiper Calidris acuminata

Singles were seen well on two dates.

Oriental Pratincole Glareola maldivarum

c90 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

Common Gull Larus canus

Four 2nd c-y *heinei* birds on Windy Beach on 9th... we duly took the trouble to eliminate *kamtschatschensis*!

'Yellow-legged' Gull Larus (cachinnans) mongolicus

Three bird-days. Noted on two dates.

Heuglin's Gull Larus heuglini taimyrensis

Three bird-days. Adults were noted on two dates.

***In addition, unidentified 'Herring' Gulls were noted on two dates – four birds in total.

Common Black-headed Gull Larus ridibundus

420+ bird-days. Noted on six dates - main event 295 on 9th.

Common Tern Sterna hirundo

81 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

Little Tern Sterna albifrons

Six bird-days. Noted on two dates.

Whiskered Tern Chlidonias hybrida

14 on 11th.

White-winged Black Tern Chlidonias leucopterus

Ten bird-days. Noted on three dates.

Blue Hill Pigeon Columba rupestris

Four on 10th.

***In addition, five were seen N of Beijing on 3th.

Oriental Turtle Dove Streptopelia orientalis

38+ bird-days. Noted on six dates.

***In addition, two N of Huairou on 4th.

Eurasian Collared Dove Streptopelia decaocto

Six bird-days. Noted on three dates.

***Spotted Dove Streptopelia chinensis

Three bird-days. Noted N of Beijing on both 4+12th.

Little Owl Athene noctua

Four bird-days. Noted on three dates – one 'scoped on 9th.

***Ssp *plumiceps* may merit full species status: R Klim pers. com.

Long-eared Owl Asio otus

One seen well on 11th.

White-throated Needletail Hirundapus caudacutus

Four on 7th, incl one which passed close to where we were enjoying a field breakfast...

Common Swift Apus apus

Three on 9th.

***In addition, 10+ over Beijing station on 4th.

Fork-tailed Swift Apus pacificus

One over the hotel on 9th.

***Common Kingfisher Alcedo atthis

Nine N of Huairou on 4th.

***Crested Kingfisher Megaceryle lugubris

One [IG] N of Huairou on 4th.

Hoopoe Upupa epops

29 bird-days. Noted daily...

Northern Wryneck Jynx torquilla

Seven bird-days. Noted on two dates – no less than five among grounded migrants on 7th.

***Grey-capped Pygmy Woodpecker Dendrocopos canicapillus

One seen well N of Beijing on 4th.

Great Spotted Woodpecker Dendrocopos major

One on 8th

***In addition, two near Beijing on 4th.

Grey-headed Woodpecker Picus canus

One on 10th.

***In addition, three – incl two seen well – N of Beijing on 4th.

Chinese Grey Shrike Lanius sphenocercus

Four bird-days. Noted on two dates – two 'scoped on 7th was the 1st of many memorable sightings that day...

Eastern Azure-winged Magpie Cyanopica cyanus

Two on 5th.

***In addition just one near Beijing on 4th.

***Red-billed Blue Magpie Urocissa erythrorhyncha

16 N of Huairou on 4th.

Common Magpie Pica pica

Common – not systematically recorded.

***Red-billed Chough Pyrrhocorax pyrrhocorax

Six N of Beijing on 4th.

Daurian Jackdaw Corvus dauuricus

26 bird-days. Noted on four dates – both attractive, pied adults & all-black 2nd c-y birds were seen well.

Rook Corvus frugilegus

26+ bird-days. Noted on three dates.

***In addition, a singleton N of Beijing on 4th.

Carrion Crow Corvus corone

c40 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

***Large-billed Crow Corvus macrorhynchos

Two en route N of Beijing on 4th.

'Eastern' Great Tit Parus minor

Two [WF] on 10th.

***In addition, ten were seen by all N of Beijing on 4th.

Yellow-bellied Tit Parus venustulus

Three flew S over the hotel on 9th.

Coal Tit Parus ater

Four bird-days. Noted on 6+8th.

Marsh Tit Parus palustris

Two [LL] on 10th.

***In addition, at least one near Beijing on 4th.

***Songar Tit Parus songarus stotzneri

Three N of Beijing on 4th.

'Chinese' Penduline Tit Remiz consobrinus

60+ bird-days. Noted on six dates – it was good to get 'scope views of two feeding on 7th!

Sand Martin Riparia riparia

1,575+ bird-days. Noted on six dates - main event 1,100+ on 9th.

Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica

215+ bird-days. Noted on six dates.

Northern House Martin Delichon urbicum

c19 bird-days. Noted on two dates.

Red-rumped Swallow Cecropis daurica

64+ bird-days. Noted on five dates.

Long-tailed Tit Aegithalos caudatus vinaceus

Two on 10th.

- ***In addition, one N of Huairou on 4th.
- ***IOC elevates the taxa *vinaceus* & *glaucogularis* to full species status as 'Silver-throated Bushtit'.

Mongolian Lark Melanocorypha mongolica

Eight on 7th.

Asian Short-toed Lark Calandrella cheleensis

C30 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

Crested Lark Galerida cristata

Three on 10th.

Eurasian Skylark Alauda arvensis

23+ on 7th.

Chinese Hill Warbler Rhopophilus pekinensis

One heard on 10th.

***In addition, <u>17</u> near Beijing on 4th (where we in the end had to resort to prompting to obtain satisfactory views of this skulky endemic).

Dusky Warbler Phylloscopus fuscatus

25 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

***Radde's Warbler Phylloscopus schwarzi

One heard N of Beijing on 4th.

Pallas's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus proregulus

32 bird-days. Noted on six dates – main event 26 on 10th.

***In addition, two were noted N of Beijing on 4th.

Yellow-browed Warbler Phylloscopus inornatus

67+ bird-days. Noted daily - main event 25+ on 11th.

***Remarkably, none could be found N of Beijing on 4th...

Pere David's Laughingthrush Garrulax davidi

Four on 10th.

***In addition, 13 N of Huairou on 4th - superb views were had of this subtly attractive N China endemic.

***Vinous-throated Parrotbill Paradoxornis webbianus

Four N of Beijiing on 4th.

Daurian Starling Sturnus sturninus

Two [WF] on 9th.

White-cheeked Starling Sturnus cineraceus

55+ bird-days. Noted on six dates.

White's Thrush Zoothera aurea

One [WF] on 6th.

Eyebrowed Thrush Turdus obscurus

Four bird-days. Noted on two dates.

Red-throated Thrush Turdus ruficollis

An adult male on 7th was somewhat unexpected – though it really shouldn't have been, given that the species is reasonably common at e g Beijing from October well into April.

Naumann's Thrush Turdus naumanni

11 bird-days. Noted on three dates – both sspp *naumanni* & *eunomus* (as well as intermediates!) were seen well.

***Extensive interbreeding (a high proportion of birds @ Beijing & Beidaihe are intermediate: JH pers obs) disqualifies the two taxa from full species status under the BSC.

Bluethroat Luscinia svecica

One [WF, LL] on 7th.

Siberian Rubythroat Luscinia calliope

Five bird-days. Noted on four dates – we were all blown away by our 1st adult male, and all the more so as it was but part of a fall of migrants which also included Red-flanked Bluetail, several Pallas' Leaf Warblers, and lots of Little & Black-faced Buntings all allowing prolonged viewing

Northern Red-flanked Bluetail Luscinia cyanura

Super views of two on 6th.

Daurian Redstart Phoenicurus auroreus

Six on 10th.

***In addition, 11 were noted N of Beijing on 4th...several were showy males staking out territories.

'Siberian' Stonechat Saxicola 'torquatus'

91 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

***In addition, a singleton was seen N of Beijing on 4th.

Pied Wheatear Oenanthe pleschanka

Five birds on 10th.

White-throated Rock Thrush Monticola gularis

Two singletons [GP, IG] on 10th.

Red-throated Flycatcher Ficedula albicilla

19+ bird-days.

***In addition, a singleton N of Beijing on 4th.

***Brown Dipper Cinclus pallasii

One N of Beijing on 4th.

***Russet Sparrow Passer rutilans

17 N of Beijing on 4th.

Eurasian Tree Sparrow Passer montanus

Common – not systematically recorded.

Eastern Yellow Wagtail Motacilla tschutschensis

390+ bird-days. Noted on six dates.

- ***This species consists of *tschutschensis* (includes *simillima*), *taivana* & *macronyx* we saw all three forms.
- ***Alstrom & Mild (2003; p287) conclude that "[...] the Yellow Wagtail complex is probably most appropriately classified as two species also under the BSC" (p34). Retained in *M. flava* are *flavissima*, *flava*, *beema*, *thunbergi* (incl. *plexa*), *iberiae*, *cinereocapillla*, *pygmaea*, *feldegg*, *lutea* & *leucocephala*. This treatment is adopted by Rasmussen & Anderton (2005).
- ***As R Klim pointed out on the trip, since *macronyx* & *thunbergi* 'can only be reliably separated by molecular markers' (Alstrom & Mild (2003), p288), with *thunbergi* breeding E to the Kolyma River ((Alstrom & Mild (2003), p275) we can't be sure we didn't see Western Yellow Wagtail *Motacilla flava* as well!

Grey Wagtail Motacilla cinerea

Singles on two dates.

***In addition, no less than 21 birds were seen N of Beijing on 4th.

White Wagtail Motacilla alba

15 bird-days. Noted on four dates – ten were ssp *ocularis*, and at least two were ssp *leucopsis*.

***In addition, seven were seen N of Beijing on 4th.

Richard's Pipit Anthus richardi

20 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

Blyth's Pipit Anthus godlewskii

One migr on 11th, flying low overhead & calling repeatedly.

***In addition, two N of Beijing on 4th.

Olive-backed Pipit Anthus hodgsoni

35 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

***In addition, 14 were recorded N of Huairou on 4th.

Red-throated Pipit Anthus cervinus

Nine bird-days. Noted on two dates.

***Rosy Pipit Anthus roseus

Three (incl a winter-plumaged bird seen well) N of Beijing on 4th.

Buff-bellied Pipit Anthus rubescens

33 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

***In addition, one was noted N of Beijing on 4th.

Brambling Fringilla montifringilla

18 bird-days. Noted on three dates.

Oriental Greenfinch Carduelis sinica

11 bird-days. Noted on three dates.

***In addition, eight were seen well N of Beijing on 4th.

Eurasian Siskin Carduelis spinus

Six on 10th.

***In addition, a male & two females were 'scoped N of Beijing on 4th.

Common Rosefinch Carpodacus erythrinus

An adult male was seen very well on 8th.

***Hawfinch Coccothraustes coccothraustes

53+ N of Beijing on 4th.

Eastern Rock Bunting Emberiza godlewskii

Three on 10th.

***In addition, 18 were noted N of Beijing on 4th.

Meadow Bunting Emberiza cioides

31 bird-days. Noted on three days – main event 25 on 10th.

***In addition, 23 were seen N of Huairou on 4th.

Jankowski's Bunting Emberiza jankowskii

Two pairs on 7th.

***We were relieved to find that no further habitat destruction had occurred since 2010 but even cautious optimism may be premature: the fact remains that the known world population is down to a few pairs, and there's little hope of discovering viable populations anywhere.

***One of the problems in working to save it is that even on the very brink of extinction it remained low-profile (and up until May 2010 listed as only 'Vulnerable') compared to the wetland species, notably cranes, for which many of the reserves in this little-visited part of Asia were created.

None of this is very surprising, if still terribly sad: broadly speaking Jankowski's Bunting's slip towards extinction started with the opening up of Ussuriland and Manchuria to ever-more intense grazing and agriculture in the 1800s.

Tristram's Bunting Emberiza tristrami

Three bird-days. Noted on two dates.

Little Bunting Emberiza pusilla

355+ bird-days. Noted on six dates – it was a real treat to see as many as 140+ in a day. ***In addition, 30+ N of Beijing on 4th.

Yellow-browed Bunting Emberiza chrysophrys

19 bird-days. Noted on four dates.

Yellow-throated Bunting Emberiza elegans

15 bird-days. Noted on six dates.

***In addition, 13 were seen N of Huairou on 4th.

Yellow-breasted Bunting Emberiza aureola

Noted on two dates – three males!

Black-faced Bunting Emberiza spodocephala

160+ bird-days. Noted daily... main event 85 on 6th.

Pallas's Reed Bunting Emberiza pallasi

22 bird-days. Noted on five dates.

***In addition, two were seen N of Beijing on 4th.

Japanese Reed Bunting Emberiza yessoensis

Single males were Noted on two dates.

Mammals:

Sequence and taxonomy follows "A Guide to the Mammals of China", Smith & Xie (ed.) 2008.

Daurian Ground Squirrel *Spermophilus dauuricus* Noted on at least three dates.

***Pere David's Rock Squirrel Sciurotamias davidianus One N of Huairou on 5th.

Red Fox Vulpes vulpes One on 6th & two on 8th.
